Research Study to provide holistic support to women survivors of burns as a result of violence

Our Flagship Programs

125 intakes at hospital, 33 home visits, 27 resident intakes and 31 non-resident intakes

Vidiyal: Rehabilitation Program for Women Survivors of Burns

PCVC began its work with women burn survivors of burns at KMC hospital in 2004. The living condition for women in the burns ward was not good and lacked hygiene and essential burns diet. PCVC started providing disposable gowns and sheets, drinking water and nutritional high protein diet. The survival rate for women was very low most, succumbed to their injuries due to high degree of burns or lack of proper care in the hospital and post discharge. PCVC decided to expand their work to meet this need. In Dec 2012 we inaugurated a 10 beded burns rehabilitation unit under technical guidance of Sunshine Foundation, Taiwan supported by Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA), Taiwan. The 3 year collaboration ended in Dec 2015. Since Jan 2016 PCVC has sustained the high resourced project on its merits supported by domestic community and individuals.

Crisis Intervention program

We run a 24-hour crisis line where women in an emergency or otherwise may call for any kind of help. Depending upon their need we then directly help them or refer them to other places for support.



16 women in Astitiva and Vetri Padi



Supported by Frauenhilfe Frankfurt e.v., Germany

Astitiva is short stay home in an undisclosed location where women with their children may come and stay once they decide to leave their abuse partners. PCVC provides basic amenities at the Astitiva home and pays for their food and medical expense. Here they are prepared mentally and emotionally to become strong to face the challenges. PCVC's team helps them find jobs and/or supports their training and equips them to get jobs. **Vetri Padi** is another short stay home where the woman along with her children is shifted to, once she starts working and until she independent enough and moves out to be on her own.

The journey from Astitva to Vetri Padi is important and is well marked physically as well, even if it may mean shifting from one room to another in the same building...

Devika was only 17 when she was married off. Husband was abusive from the very beginning. He always wrongly accused her that their son was illegitimate. When the abuses become difficult to bear, Devika left him and returned to her parents. She fell in love and remarried. Later came to know that her second partner was already married...During one of regular fights that she used to have with him, she threatened to kill herself by poring kerosene, she was severely burnt. There were no chances of her survival when she was brought to burns ward of Kilpauk Medical College, Chennai. After her treatment at KMC, she was admitted at PCVC's burns rehabilitation unit.

Devika spent 8 months at PCVC, going through tough regime of physical therapy and psychosocial intervention. Today she is on PCVC's team inspiring, and helping others.

About Us

PCVC is a non-profit organisation and registered as a trust in 2001. Founded in response to the state's noticeable absence of support agencies for women survivors of domestic abuse, PCVC's journey from 2001 has been challenging in an attempt to formulate better and effective interventions for women survivors.

Services include:

- 24-hour crisis support hotline
- Safe emergency shelter
- Counselling and referrals for legal aids for cases referred by local police stations



CLAPP: Community Led Action Program with Police (CLAPP) on Women's Safety in Public Places

Supported by U.S. Consulate General Hyderabad

Based on the philosophy of community policing, the goal of the project was to reduce sexual harassment and violence against women in public places and educational institutions through collaborative response and prevention initiatives of police and community, especially young adults and youth.

The project was based in Hyderabad and we worked in close collaboration with SHE Teams, Hyderabad Police and St. Mary's College, Hyderabad.

Response and Assessment

For the Police

- Training module on gender sensitive policing
- A training for trainers for the SHE Team on responding to gender-based crimes

For College

- Setting up a student's cell on sexual harrassment and other gender-based issues
- Training for colleges on enacting policies and awareness measures to deal with sexual harassment within and outside the institution

General

- Devising communication material to help disseminate information
- Using current CLAPP members to share their experience, raise awareness, serve as mentors/trainers for the next group
